<u>Radium Girls by Kate Moore</u> Tuesday, April 21 @ 11:30



Homegoing by Yaa Gysai Tuesday, May 19 @ 11:30






<u>The Alice Network by Kate Quinn</u> Tuesday, Oct. 15 @ 11:30


<u>One Day in December by Josie Silver</u> Tuesday, Nov. 19 @ 11:30






<u>The Story of Arthur Truluv</u> by Elizabeth Berg Tuesday, Jan. 21 @ 11:30
