

- Stories can be submitted electronically or in print
- Stories submitted electronically must be sent as a word document (please do not use pdf) to lder@hwlibrary.org. (If you do not receive a confirmation email within 72 hours, please call the Children's Room to confirm that your story was received)
- Stories should be original and started at the time of this posting
- Word count must be between 250-800 words
- Please use the 12 font size in Times New Roman for uniform legibility
- Stories must be typed, on 8 ½" x 11" page(s). Can be multiple pages/illustrated. Please do not submit double-sided pages.
- Illustrations are welcome on 8 ½" x 11" paper
- Only one story submission per person please
- Parents can assist with grammar and typing the submissions
- Titles should be on the FRONT of the first page
- Please label the BACK of the last page with your name, age, phone number, and word count
- Please do not staple the pages
- Submit stories by midnight on Saturday, November 23, 2019
